Consumer Alert

Issued by the United Church of Canada

People who are selling vehicles, particularly on the internet, should be aware of a fraud scheme that suggests The United Church of Canada will sponsor the purchase of the vehicle as a thank-you gift for someone who has faithfully served the church for many years.

The seller of the vehicle is contacted by e-mail from an individual who claims to be acting on behalf of a relative interested in buying the vehicle, and the transaction is sponsored by the United Church of Canada. The seller is asked to forward payment information to receive a cheque including additional funds to cover shipping. After receipt of the cheque, the seller is asked to forward a cheque to the agent who will handle the shipping of the vehicle. The agent never returns to take the vehicle and the seller soon finds that the cheque they received was counterfeit.

As of November 2, 2006, the General Council Office of the United Church of Canada is aware of six individuals who were contacted by this fraud artist. All are residents of the United States, and none actually sold a vehicle to them. It is suspected, however, that there may be more potential victims. Thus, this consumer alert is issued.

A Short Biography of Garth McElrea

Garth was born on the 28th of February, 1935. He was raised on a working farm in Quebec, along with a brother, 5 years older, and one 5 years younger. His mother had seven sisters and one brother, his father had one brother and two sisters. Garth was one of 42 first cousins. His grandparents lived very close by on their own farm and the whole family was very close, in the clan tradition.

Garth's mother died of a fast-acting cancer when Garth was 13. He, his brothers and his father took over the household chores and Garth was responsible for the cooking.

The boys spent their early years in a one-room schoolhouse, where they completed grade 7. Garth went to Sherbrooke High School. He rode to school with his father (who was delivering milk) but had to hitch-hike home each day. After graduation, Garth spent a year at University, then transferred to college the following year to learn accounting.

Garth attended St. Andrews Presbyterian Church in Sherbrooke and sang in their choir. After College, he accepted a position in Granby and began attending Granby United Church and sang tenor in the choir.

Marilyn's mother was lead soprano in the choir and became quite friendly with Garth. Later, Garth

started dating Marilyn and nearly three years later, asked her to marry him. The following year in 1961, they were married.

In 1962, the couple moved, first to Montreal for six months, and then to Burlington for a year where they had their first daughter. After then spending four years in Guelph where Garth earned his CMA designation (and his second daughter), they returned to Burlington.

In those first years, Garth and family belonged to the Nelson United Church where Garth was superintendent of the Sunday School. The family transferred to the Wellington Square United Church and Garth's third daughter was born. During the years at Wellington Square, Garth was an elder, belonged to numerous committees and with Marilyn, led the Youth Group (Kaleidoscope) for several years.

Garth worked for several years at Boston Insulated Wire (BIW) in Hamilton as secretary and then as acting President. After that he worked for the Ontario Development Corporation (ODC) as a Loans Assessor/Lender. Garth worked the first four years in London, all the while hoping to transfer closer to home.

A branch was opened in Windsor, where he then spent one year. He

rented small, one-bedroom apartments in both cities, and came home on the weekends. Finally, he was transferred to Mississauga where he worked for several years as the French interpreter. He then transferred to Toronto for two years. At that time, the Prime Minister closed down the group and Garth retired.

During his years back in Burlington, Garth returned to the Nelson United Church. He was active in the life of the church, serving on numerous committees, and singing in the choir. His hobbies included wood carving, playing the stand-up bass, restoring his 1932 Model 'A' Ford, attending French and Little Theatre, and rotating time amongst his three daughters, offering his assistance in whatever way was needed.

Garth's three grandsons were born during his retirement. Garth loved children and he was devoted to his family. His high standards, love of learning, unshakeable ethics, tolerant nature and great sense of humour made it easy to admire and respect him.

We miss him every day. He is now with God and that gives all of us some comfort.

Nelson United - Stewardship and Finance

Over the past three years, we at Nelson have seen our budget increase by 10%. To meet the day to day expenses, we need Approximately \$1,000.00 per week.

With about 69 families in our ministry and only about 40 contributing, it means that each family on average would have to give \$1,250.00 per year.

We fully realize that some families cannot afford this amount but fortunately some can and do contribute more than the \$1,250.00 per year.

How can we address the solution to this problem?

“PAR”

Prearranged remittance was introduced several years ago but for some unknown reason has not been accepted at Nelson nearly as well as other congregations.

Maybe it was because we did not explain or introduce it

properly or people do not trust the banking system that is used by the United Church of Canada.

In all of the years since existence, not one case of misuse has been reported. I can assure you that you have 100% control of your givings, being able to cancel any monthly donation or the entire contract with one phone call to Judi Reibot.

The advantages of this program are twofold.

- 1) It allows the church to have an evenly distributed income for the entire year rather than very low in summer and high at year end as it now happens, making it difficult to pay the expenses every month.
 - 2) “PAR” is a good personal business approach to satisfy a year long need and makes giving a planned approach to what God wants each one of us to give **FREELY** and **WILLINGLY** for his work in Nelson United Church.

Pioneer Church Tour Report

The 2006 Pioneer Church Tour has come and gone for 2006 and was a successful endeavor. Seven churches participated in this year's tour. All participating congregations should be made aware that the tour was not meant to be a money-making venture, but a public awareness event. The real purpose of the Church Tour was to make the communities-at-large aware of the pioneer churches that exist in this area of Halton.

The income from the sale of Tour Passports and from the sale of advertising in the passports amounted to \$1,833.14 less the printing expenses of \$125.16. This left a net income of \$1,707.98 for the 2006 Tour.

During the final Tour Committee meeting for 2006, it was decided that the funds would be left in the Tour bank account as seed money for the Pioneer Church Tours. If a presently participating church withdraws from any future tours, that church shall receive 1/7th of the above receipts.

It was decided by the committee to hold the next Pioneer Church Tour on May 3, 2008. Moving the date forward from October to May would make it necessary to not hold the tour in 2007 due to the time required for preparation.

For the Pioneer Tour to continue being financially viable, we would truly encourage each member of all participating congregations to try and sell at least 2 of the Tour Passports to their friends and neighbors.

The Tour Committee is planning to invite a total of 12 churches to participate in the 2008 Tour and producing a 2008 Calendar of historic churches within our area of Halton Region.

Lowville Stewardship - "What Is Stewardship?"

Stewardship as we normally know it, is a ministry of church members graciously requesting that each of us give monetary donations to the best of our ability, to donate by PAR, etc. and we understand that these funds are needed for the church to continue its' daily existence. Sometimes, we are able to give more and sometimes we plan to give more, but sometimes life gets in the way and our plans don't always turn out the way that we intended.

However, stewardship is not just a ministry of church members, and does not necessarily mean that we make our donations with monetary funds. There are many ways that we can provide for the needs of the church and many of you are already doing so. We can take part in church functions, such as being on committees, getting involved in the worship services, choir, Sunday School, pastoral care, and work bees, etc. Helping the church to function is also a part of stewardship.

The Lowville United Church is a beautiful country church and many of the families attending have been a part of it for generations. Some hold desperately tight to a few of its' earlier traditions and others invite different ways of looking at how things get done. Regardless, the church is there for each of us as we wish it to be, and we can be there for the church, whether we attend services regularly, only the special services, or not at all.

Stewardship can also mean taking part in fundraising events, helping to plan or organize, to set up, taking an active part in the event, or helping to clean up afterwards. Helping to bring the event to a successful conclusion and raising funds for the church is also an act of stewardship and is also very much needed in the operation and needs of the church.
